


The Wolseley Hornet was launched in April 1930 to wide acclaim. It was effectively a luxury, long wheel base, six-cylinder Morris Minor using the Minor's body, gearbox and extended engine. The stopping power was provided by Lockheed hydraulic brakes. At the time of its launch the Hornet Saloon was the cheapest six-cylinder car on Britain's roads.

These images of one of the launch vehicles have been scanned from original retouched artwork and have subsequently received some attention in photoshop.




1930 Wolseley Hornet rolling chassis - side elevation







Hornet chassis - front & rear views




Hornet chassis - back axle & differential
